Dear Parents/Guardians

2009 has been an eventful year for us at ACS (Independent). We are thankful for the many blessings from God. ACS (Independent) continues to be a value-added school. In the field of co-curricular activities, we did equally well, winning 12 Gold medals, 8 silver medals and 3 bronze medals in sports and games and emerged as the overall Top Boys' School for sports and games (B & C Division) for the 13th time last year. For our achievements we were awarded the Sustained Achievement Awards (SAA) for Sports (10th consecutive year). We also won the SAA for Uniformed Groups (10th consecutive award) and for Physical Fitness (7th consecutive award).

Our greatest achievement for 2009 is that we were awarded the Singapore Quality Award [SQA]. ACS (Independent) is the first school in Singapore to win this top award under the Business Excellence Awards Scheme in Singapore. This award is also instituted in countries like USA, Europe, Japan and Australia. The SQA is the pinnacle award for business excellence, introduced in 1994, in Singapore. With the Prime Minister as its Patron, the Award is presented to organisations which have demonstrated outstanding management capabilities and delivered superior performance and results. A rigorous assessment process ensures that only the most worthy are honoured. The Award recognizes our effort in operationalising our strategic plan to achieve world-class excellence through whole-hearted commitment at all levels of leadership and motivating our staff, both academic and non-academic, to serve our students. To garner such an Award would not have been possible without the unstinting support of the Ministry of Education, our Boards of Governors and Management, Church, Old Boys' Association, Parents, Alumni, Partners and Friends. Indeed the inherent holistic approach of the Business Excellence framework has been a medium for us to give further expression to our vision and mission, enabling us to showcase the sterling results in all our operations. As such, we have "soared on wings of eagles" and will continue to improve, God being our inspiration and helper! We will not rest on our laurels after winning this Award but will continue to improve all our systems and processes to innovate, create and add value to our brand of education, providing for our customers – students and stakeholders. My deep gratitude and appreciation go to our Boards of Governors and Management, Senior Administration, Staff and Students for their unflagging passion, undivided dedication and unwavering commitment. Chinese New Year Holiday

Please take note that Chinese New Year falls on Sunday and Monday, 14 – 15 February. Tuesday 16 February is a holiday in lieu of Sunday. We have decided to declare **Wednesday, 17 February** as an additional holiday for the school. There will be a Chinese New Year concert on Friday, 12 February which is compulsory for all students. Parents are kindly requested not to take the students away from school other than on the stipulated holidays mentioned. The School would appreciate it if parents would adhere strictly to the dates for school holidays when planning their family vacation. We regret that we will **not** be able to approve holiday leave during official school curriculum time.

2. **SCHOOL HOURS**

In line with MOE’s 5-day work week policy, all uniformed group (UG) activities will be conducted on Fridays from 2.30 p.m. to 6.30 p.m. except for Boys’ Brigade, Symphonic Band and ‘B’ Division Rugby Team which will still hold practices on Saturdays.

3. **DROP-OFF/PICK-UP ZONES**

To avoid traffic congestion we would appreciate it if you would allow your children/ward to alight only at the designated drop-off points. **Please avoid waiting or parking on Double-Yellow Lines** when you are waiting to pick up your children. You should use available visitors’ parking lots as far as possible. All regular vehicles coming to the school are required to register with the Estate Office and a car park label will be issued. Please co-operate with our security guard at the main front gate of the school regarding entry and parking of your vehicles.

4. **PARENTS’ BRIEFING BY PRINCIPAL/ PARENTS-TEACHERS MEETING (PTM)**

These are important for parents to note. The first Parents’ briefing by Principal is scheduled on **Saturday, 30 January, from 1.30 p.m. to 3 p.m.** at the school auditorium when teachers would be introduced to the students’ parents. There will be a **charity bazaar from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m.**, and we appeal to parents to patronise the stalls, set up by our students returning from their Overseas Education Programmes. The next PTM session scheduled for Thursday, 27 May is for parents to meet the children’s teachers individually to discuss the progress/conduct of their children in school. The third session is for selected parents whom the teachers would specially

like to meet to discuss how the students could be helped to improve. It will be held in the final week of Term III and parents will be notified nearer the date. Apart from these sessions, parents are encouraged to keep in contact with teachers as and when required. **Please confirm your attendance at the first briefing session in the Response Slip enclosed.**

5. **124th FOUNDER'S DAY CELEBRATION AND ACADEMIC AWARDS PRESENTATION**

The **124th Founder's Day** will be celebrated on **Monday, 1 March 2010**. This event will include our annual Academic Awards Presentation and will begin from 8.30 a.m. and end with a reception at about 12.30 p.m. We would like to take this opportunity to invite you to the above function. Guests are requested to be seated by **8.15 am**. Attire for men will be **shirt & tie**. **Kindly respond using the enclosed slip.**

To commemorate the 124th Founder's Day, the Old Boys' Association has also planned a dinner for 1 March 2010. More details will be given to your children/ward when available. We hope you will be able to support the event.

6. **OVERSEAS EDUCATION PROGRAMME [OEP]**

The overseas education programme at ACS (Independent) has become a hallmark activity in our school. Since its inception in 1999, the OEP has been expanded and extended to Year 2, 3, 4 and 5 students. The objectives of our education programme are to provide:

- (a) experiential learning through field study opportunities in the areas of Geography, History, Physics, Biology, Chemistry and the Languages;
- (b) team building and adventure challenges;
- (c) experiences in cross cultural living and community working and living experiences in an overseas environment.

For the year 2010, the OEP for Year 3 will be held in various destinations, namely, Kunming/Lijiang, Shanghai/Suzhou/Hangzhou (PRC), Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam as well as Taipeh and Kaoshiung, Taiwan. All students are expected to participate in this programme and only students with medical condition may be excused. The programme will cover a 6 or 7-day period from 17 – 23/24 January 2010. The cost for the programme ranges between \$1100 - \$1600 per student (part of this can be drawn from the students' Edusave account, if they have one).

The Year 2 students will continue with their OEP in West Malaysia from 17 – 22 January 2010. The cost for the programme will be approximately \$520 per student.

The Year 4 students will participate in a Character Development Programme which will be conducted in West Malaysia from 17 – 22 January 2010. The cost of the programme will be approximately \$590 per student.

The Year 5 OEP [Window on the World] will be conducted from 1 – 7 May 2010.

A **charity bazaar** has been planned for **Saturday, 30 January 2010** in conjunction with the first PTM to raise funds for our community involvement programmes overseas. We look forward to your enthusiastic support.

7. **ASSESSMENTS & PROMOTIONS MATTERS**

The weighting of marks for common tests, coursework and examinations for the different academic programmes and levels in the school are detailed below. Promotion to the next level will be based on students' performance in these common tests, coursework and examinations.

The school has decided that class tests conducted in Term 1 will not bear a weighting towards the Overall Results at the end of the year to lessen the stress of testing. The class tests are meant for diagnostic purposes in evaluating the progress of the students' course of study so that appropriate remediation programme can be activated.

Parents/Guardians of Year 3 students are to note that promotion to Year 4 will be based on the Year 3 examination results and other assessments. In order to be promoted to Year 4, students must obtain a **pass (50% or more) in at least five subjects:**

1. English Language/Higher Mother Tongue
2. Elementary Mathematics/Additional Mathematics
3. Chemistry/Physics/Biology
4. Combined Humanities/Literature/ History/ Geography
5. Any other subject

A re-examination will be conducted in November 2010 for Year 3 students who have met the promotion criteria but failed in other subjects. A pass in the subject(s) sat for in the re-examination is necessary for the student to offer the subject(s) in the Year 4 GCE 'O' Level Examination for the following year. In other words, students must drop the subjects they fail in at the re-examination.

For Year 4 express students, the preliminary examination serves to provide practice for the GCE 'O' Level examination and is a useful gauge of a student's progress.

- 3. A grade requirement of at least grade 4 or better in these 6 subjects.**

The six relevant subjects for Year 1 and 2 are:

1. Language Arts
2. Mother Tongue*
3. History/Earth Sciences
4. Mathematics
5. Physical Sciences/Life Sciences
6. Any other subject

The six relevant subjects for Year 3 and 4 are:

1. Language Arts
2. Mother Tongue*
3. IHS/History/Geography
4. Core Maths/Advanced Maths
5. Physics/Chemistry/Biology
6. Any other subject

**This subject will be replaced with any other subject for a student who has been exempted from offering the Mother Tongue Language.*

However, every IP student should aim for a minimum aggregate of 36 points in the 6 relevant subjects.

For promotions to Year 6, students must obtain an overall aggregate point of **at least 28 points based on 6 relevant subjects and perform satisfactorily in Theory of Knowledge and Extended Essay**. They must also meet the grade requirements for each subject (refer to IB handbook for the award of the IB diploma). However, every IB student should aim for a minimum aggregate of 38 points.

A focus/study camp and a re-examination will be conducted in November 2010 for Year 5 students who have not met the target aggregate points.

A Dean’s List programme will be conducted in November 2010 for Year 5 students who have done exceptionally well in the particular subject area(s). Students will undergo a 10 hour course of study specially designed for high ability students in order to provide them with additional enriched options in the respective academic areas.

ALL STUDENTS

There will be one test or coursework for each subject per term and continual assessments (in the form of worksheets and assignments) throughout the year. All tests and answer scripts are returned to students and parent’s signature on the scripts are required. Parents are advised to help monitor their children by taking note of their performance in the class tests and examinations. All students will be issued with qualitative progress reports in Terms 1 & 3 and result slips will be issued in Terms 2 & 4.

8. **SPECIAL LIFE SCIENCES COURSE**

In view of the current emphasis on Life Sciences and our Government’s vision to make

Singapore an international Life Sciences hub of distinction, ACS (Independent) has responded to this clarion call and in 2010, it will be 9th year that the school is running the Life Sciences Programme to equip our students with the necessary skills to meet the challenges ahead. The Year 1 and 2 students will have a special course organised for them, taught by our teachers, in consultation with experts in the Microbiology and Molecular Biology fields. There will be a fee (one-time payment) of \$170 for Year 1 and \$195 for Year 2 for the course. For Year 2 students, please make the payment by cheque, addressed to “ACS (Independent)”, to be submitted to the class teachers by Friday, 8 January. (Year 1 students would have got a copy of the Edusave Withdrawal Form in the orientation package).

9. **TABLET PC**

The school will continue with the EdVantage Programme (tablet PC) for Year 3 and 4 students. The EdVantage programme is a flagship programme started by the Infocomm Development Authority of Singapore (IDA) with the support of the Ministry of Education to bring about a new paradigm in teaching by leveraging on IT and by providing a student-centric, collaborative and more effective learning environment that extends beyond the classroom. The school however discontinued the compulsory programme in 2009 for Year 1 students due to the economic crisis that hit the global world. Another reason for discontinuation of the compulsory purchase scheme tied to a specific vendor was to allow parents a free choice of laptops to meet their children’s needs. However Year 3 and 4 students who bought their tablet PC in Year 1 will be expected to bring their tablet PCs to school for lessons. Students who encounter difficulty with their tablet PCs can seek help at the school IT support office located at Level 2 in the old school campus.

10. **BOARDING SCHOOL**

Our experience in operating the Boarding School has been pleasant and meaningful. This year, the enrolment has been overwhelming and the Boarding School is full to capacity. A number of academic programmes have been organised, aimed at helping students in their performance. These include regular prep sessions (2 hours per session, 5 times a week in the evenings, afternoon prep sessions three times a week, each lasting 1½ hours), remedials, tutorials and “Practice Makes Perfect” sessions, all of which are supervised by the 32 teachers who are in residence with the boarders. In addition, a Special Boarding Programme for Singapore citizens will be offered to students in the Year 2 Integrated Programme this year. Vacancies are limited and on a first-come-first served basis. Further details will be given to students separately.

11. **STUDENT HANDBOOK & DIARY**

The school Student Handbook incorporates an added feature of a student diary as well. All students will be required to purchase a copy. Parents/Guardians will play an active role in supporting the school in monitoring their children/wards in their education. Parents/Guardians are informed through the Handbook and Diary on the policies and procedures, code of conduct, discipline matters and relevant information about school facilities and services through the diary. We also need the co-operation of all parents and guardians to sign and check against the diary entries regularly as we attempt to track the progress and performance of students throughout the year.

12. **SCHOOL FEES FOR YEAR 5 STUDENTS**

As per guidelines on school fees payable for Year 5 students, there will be no change to the school fees payable, i.e. collection of school fees will start from January 2010 through to December 2010.

13. **POLICY ON PREMATURE WITHDRAWAL FROM SCHOOL**

Students who leave the school prematurely will pay the fees for the full year.

14. **STUDENT ACCIDENT INSURANCE (COMPULSORY)**

The School has arranged with NTUC Income to provide accident insurance for all students. The annual premium per student for Year 1 to Year 6 is **\$11.65**. The amount will be deducted via GIRO later and parents will be informed by the School. We enclose the information (see Annex A) on the insurance policy with regards to benefits and claims under the Student Protection Plan for your information.

15. **STUDENT SPORTS INJURY PLAN (OPTIONAL)**

Parents may also purchase an optional Sports Injury Plan if their child is training frequently or is involved in physically demanding CCAs. This plan is a rider to the basic Student Accident Insurance and will give additional coverage to the basic plan. The details to this rider are enclosed (see Annex B) for your consideration. The annual premium for this rider for Year 1 to Year 4 is **\$4.20** and **\$9.80** for Year 5 to Year 6.

Should you wish to take up the Student Sports Injury Plan, please complete the reply slip together with the premium payment [cash/cheque – payable to ACS (I)] and return it to your child's CCA teacher by 11 Jan 2010.

16. **SUNBLOCK FOR STUDENTS ENGAGED IN OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES**

Research has highlighted the need for those who are exposed to the sun for a prolonged period during outdoor activities to use sun protection. The school would like to advise parents to encourage their children to use sun block or sun screen if they are engaged in activities that require them to be in the sun for an extended time. We will further advise parents to seek their family physician's advice with regards to any possible allergic reaction in relation to the use of the sunscreen products.

17. **STUDENT WELFARE FUND**

The School welcomes donations for the Student Welfare Fund which goes to help our needy students through various schemes such as the provision of School Pocket Money. We would appreciate if you could make your cheque payable to [Anglo-Chinese School (Independent)].

18. **ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF COMMUNICATION FROM SCHOOL**

The School would appreciate it if parents could acknowledge all written communication whenever it carries a "Response Slip" or "Acknowledgement Slip". This is to ensure that parents/guardians are kept informed of activities involving their children and/or themselves.

- Horse riding as a supervised CCA
- Student riding as pillion on motorcycle to and from school with the parent or guardian
- Injuries caused by lightning
- Dog bites and bee stings
- Sailing, canoeing and other supervised water activities

Main Exclusions

This Policy does not cover injuries caused by unsupervised activities such as horse riding, scuba diving, hunting, riding a motorcycle, injuries sustained while under the influence of alcohol or drugs, racing other than on foot, self-inflicted injuries, injuries due to insanity, food poisoning and dengue fever.
